From Kenya, with love... (Part 1)

Q Why Kenya?

For a long time I looked at the sad faces and the malnourished children, women and cattle in pictures and television that impressed in my mind the fact that Africa suffered the worst poverty and famines in the world. I had a desire to help in any way possible. The opportunity came when my good friends and neighbours asked me if I



was interested in attending a 4 days retreat there and see the state of the poor.



Q What did you see?

There were two main areas we saw. They were the slums in **Eastland**, in Nairobi and **the Muthale Mission Hospital** in the county side diocese called Kitui, which is 3 hours by car from Nairobi.

Let me tell you about the **Mukuru slums first**. The people here are homeless, in a

huge area of a few acres, with no sanitation., no piped water supply, no proper homes and no basic facilities and no food . Most people do not even have a meal a day. There were 2 rows of huts with straw and zinc roofs, cardboard and paper walls, barely one stuffy room without ventilation where the large families sit, cook, and sleep. You cannot imagine the squalor until you see it, We will never see this in Singapore thank God.

Father Conor's team of young people from the Opus Dei Spirituality are helping him with a number of projects, like helping boys to go to school, building a school in that area fro education, a basket ball field for the kids and so on.

The people were jobless, young boys in groups loitering around, no school, no



jobs, nowhere to go. The women were mostly single mothers with an average of 5 to 7 kids all below 10 to 12 years old. Fathers were nowhere to be seen. Women are docile, uneducated with no rights whatsoever. They are dominated by men. Their lives are ever so full of pain and suffering.



Q What did you do in Muthale Mission Hospital?

This hospital is situated in one of the 24 dioceses in Kenya. The hospital has 78 in patient beds. The staffing is minimum no of nurses , one MBBS trained doctor and 3 diploma trained doctors. The MBBS trained doctor does medical, surgical and O&G cases.

Only the very serious cases are referred to the nearest hospital far away, which requires a 3 hour long car journey.



The first day I was taken round the hospital to see the services. I started work the next day from 8.30 am to 5 pm and on night duty alternate nights. I did all the work there except the surgeries and LSCS as I was not trained for that. So I treated medical cases of all types, children with malaria, AIDs and malnutrition and URTI. I treated several adults with AIDS and malaria, besides diabetes hypertension and bronchial asthmas.

The night calls were especially exciting and challenging.



Q Why do you say that?

My first night was dramatic. We can sleep in out cottages and go to hospital when the call comes. An emergency call from the hospital came at 1 am. It was a 15 year old boy staying in a school hostel. He complained of a headache at 8 pm. The next minute he fell on the floor unconscious. The teachers and relatives rushed him to hospital.

I saw him lying motionless on the hospital bed with all the teachers and relatives around me. A quick eye balling saw the young boy lying motionless on the bed, not a movement noted. My heart was fluttering and my head searching "What could it be? " Clinically GCS 4, pupils non responsive, not dilated, neck rigidity. No motor reflexes . I could only think of cerebral malaria. We can only go by clinical examination. Pump in intravenous quinine 600 mg with dexamethasone 30 mg in a IV saline drip slowly infused after a quiet prayer .

I went to sleep which was not forthcoming, tossing and turning, worried for that young lad. The next morning at 7am, I went to the ward to check Amos. I found him standing at the door of the ward, looking fine. He said he was well. At once my response was "Jesus. Thanks a lot".

The next night, I was called to see a case of septic abortion after a GP injected a oxytocin like medicine to induce abortion. The woman was in severe abdominal pain and screaming. She was stabilised and eventually had an EUA and removal of products of conception the next morning, before improving.
