† Discernment for the VERY busy

Personal vocation is God's call to each person to live the unique life of good deeds that God has prepared for him or her. It is the surest path to happiness.

I. Points to Bear in Mind when Preparing to Discern

- 1. Possible only among morally acceptable options.
- 2. Eliminate options that one cannot choose without failing to meet one's responsibilities.
- 3. Be completely detached from one's own agenda.
- 4. Cannot discern whether we should *do* something, but only whether we should *try* to do it.
- 5. Bear in mind that nothing is wasted.
- 6. Bear in mind that life does not make complete sense in this world.
- 7. Focus on the benefits of doing what we have discerned and avoid focusing on what stirs desire for the options eliminated.
- 8. Discerning one's personal vocation is ongoing.
- 9. Large commitments simplify future discernments by providing principles for discerning and by removing incompatible options
- 10. Judge the unknown by the known
- 11. Let your love for God educate your reason
- 12. Be soft- hearted and hard- headed
- 13. All God's signs should line up. There are at least seven such signs: (1) Scripture,
- (2) church teaching, (3) human reason, (4) the appropriate situation, or circumstances, (5) conscience, (6) our individual personal instincts, and (7) prayer.

Test your choice by holding it up before God's face. If one of these seven voices says no, don't do it. If none say no, do it.

14. Look for the fruits of the spirit, especially the first three: love, joy, and peace

II. The Process of Discernment

- 1. "To praise, revere, and serve God our Lord"
- 2. Every vocation is a call to service. Consider gifts and experiences and how they match up with the needs of the world. Be open to possibilities not typically considered.
- 3. Consider the pros and cons of each option.
- 4. Then, let emotion to play its part. Imagine how one would advise someone in one's situation, or imagine what one would have chosen if one were looking back, from our deathbed and on judgment day.
- 5. Pay close attention to one's affective response to each of them, for God speaks to the heart. The idea is that if one is upright, God speaks to one through the desires of one's heart.
- 6. After some time of pondering the different options, an option eventually will emerge as the more appealing, and one will be at peace with embracing it.
- 7. When that happens, one's discernment is over. Then one must accept the discernment by beginning to live it out.

In response to an invitation from **BISHOP KEKE**, CMS and CMG will be embarking on their first ever joint mission trip project together in December this year to **BATTAMBANG**, **CAMBODIA**. Our main goal will be to conduct health screening for the locals, but we will also be collecting data to better allow us to help them in subsequent trips there.

As with any mission trip, we require heavy financial support! We project the amount required to be around \$7000. This money will be used to buy medicines and medical equipment for screening, treatment and nutrition of the Battambang locals.
