To Heal the Heart, with a Heart to Heal

Into its 2nd year of conception, students from the Catholic Medical Society journeyed to Battambang Prefecture, Cambodia, to provide medical assistance and health and values education to the congregation.

"Srolanh", the name of the mission, means "Love" in Cambodia's native Khmer tongue. Indeed, that very much sums up the spirit of the mission, which was very much more concerned with sharing in the love of Christ with the communities and people we met there, be it in the process of medical work, our conversations, or our mere presence and solidarity with them...

Perhaps the most meaningful part of the trip, though, was the education lessons conducted. These lessons focused on sexuality, values and self-esteem, as well as general health and hygiene information and practices. To that end, the female members of the mission conducted a wonderful day-long programme for the girls at Don Bosco focused on self-esteem and love, which was a tremendously touching experience for all those involved...

As mentioned, this was only the 2nd mission trip to Battambang. Our eyes are slowly being opened to the very many avenues for the Catholic medical community to assist in Battambang, in collaboration with ACTS and other groups that already do so much good work, and it would be a true joy to continue to grow God's mission there with the help of the community here!

Proj. Battambang '12

Project Battambang is an overseas community project organized by students from the Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine, National University of Singapore. Every December since 2010, the team of about 25 students has been going on 2-week long missions to the Thai-Cambodian bordering district of Poipet in the Banteay Meanchey province of Cambodia. CMG supports this project by providing mentorship and some of the volunteer doctors.



Located in the northwestern part of the country, Poipet is considered one of the poorest districts in Cambodia and being a border town, the dubious reputation for child trafficking and prostitution.

The team's main focus is to supplement local basic healthcare services by conducting school and community health screenings. Aside from the health screenings, health education sessions are organized mainly on basic and dental hygiene, puberty, home and road safety, benefits of smoking cessation and strong marriages...
